Dear Guests and Friends,



the Chamber of Hungarian Health Care Professionals (CHHCP) is very pleased to host and welcome you to 10th European Transcultural Nursing Association International Conference. The CHHCP was established in 2004 pursuant to an Act of Parliament that was passed in autumn 2003.

The professional advocacy group, which represents more than 120 000 health care professionals who hold mandatory membership, was reorganised taking a bottom-up approach, along the lines of 93 local and 20 regional chapters. CHHCP was established to provide professional and ethical support for the individual paramedical fields as they evolve into professions in their own right and to independently address the issues affecting the paramedical professions. CHHCP was also established to determine and represent the professional, economic and social interests of paramedical professionals, and to contribute, commensurately with its role and weight in society, to the development of health policy and to raising the standards of healthcare provided to the population. CHHCP performs its duties by performing the tasks and exercising the authority invested in it by law.

Training courses and professional conferences are held at county, regional and national level – independently or in partnership with other professional organisations. The Chamber currently has 21 professional chapters at national level. Exercising its right of consultation, it has drawn up detailed recommendations regarding several draft laws and statutory amendments for the relevant government ministry.

Besides this, it participates in the work of the Ethical Councils established at county and national level. The establishment of the Chamber has raised the profile of issues concerning paramedical professionals and nurses in Hungary.

CHHCP aims to operate effectively as a public body capable of engaging in useful dialogue with the Minister of the Interior, municipalities and healthcare institutions. The CHHCP is collaborating with ETNA since 2005.

The conference programme reflects the high standard of abstracts submitted and there is a truly international perspective of approaches promoting transcultural health and social care in education. The aim of this conference is to encourage sharing of experiences and developing new collaboration and networks. We look forward to dialoguing and sharing ideas with you. 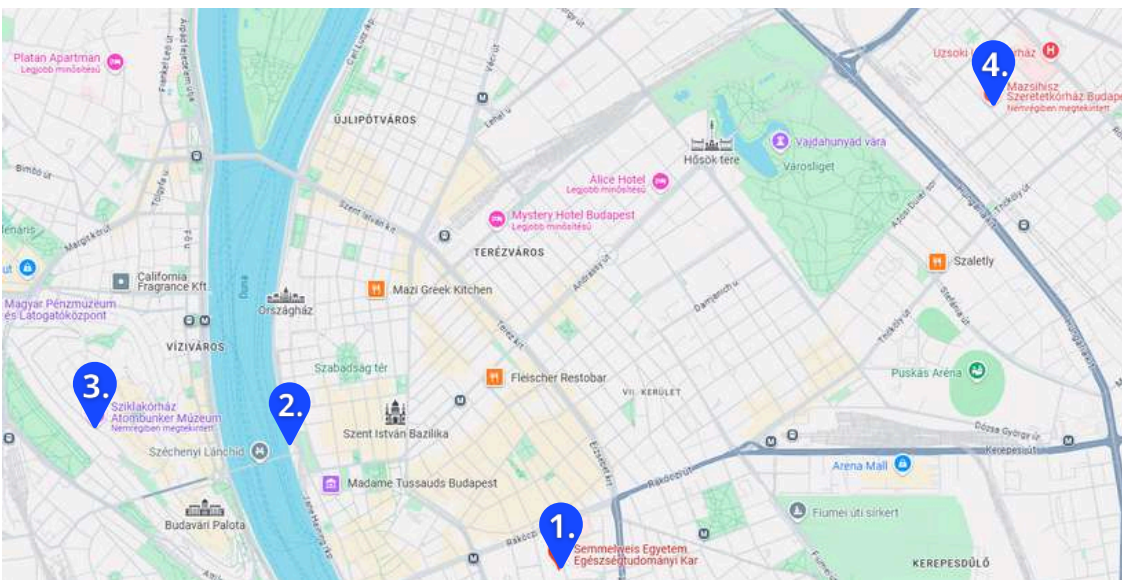

About Budapest

Brief Introduction:

Budapest, one of the most beautiful capitals in Europe, spans both sides of the Danube River. It is known for its stunning architecture, historic thermal baths, and vibrant cultural life. The city offers a perfect blend of history, art, and modern life for its visitors.

Weather:

June in Hungary can be surprisingly hot, with daytime temperatures often exceeding 30°C. While the average ranges between 25–30°C, recent years have brought frequent heatwaves even early in the month. Light, breathable clothing is strongly recommended. Evenings are generally mild, but bringing a light jacket might still be useful. Rainfall is occasional, but a compact umbrella can come in handy during sudden summer showers.

Currency & Payment Options:

The official currency in Hungary is **the Hungarian Forint (HUF)**. As a member of the European Union, the Euro (EUR) is also accepted in many places, particularly in larger restaurants, hotels, and tourist areas. However, exchange rates may vary, and not all businesses accept euros, so it is advisable to carry some cash in forints.

Credit and debit cards are widely accepted, and ATMs are readily available throughout the country. Card payment is generally a convenient and reliable option for most purchases.

Transportation

From the Airport to the City Center:

- **Public Transportation:** We strongly recommend using public transportation as it is both quick and affordable. The BKK **100E bus** connects Budapest Airport directly to the city center, with a stop at **Astoria/Kálvin tér**, which is close to the Semmelweis University Faculty of Health Sciences. The journey takes approximately 40–50 minutes. **For more detailed information on ticket prices and schedules, please visit:** [BKK Ticket Information](#).
- **Taxi:** A taxi from the airport to the city center takes approximately 25–30 minutes, depending on traffic. It is recommended to use the official taxi services available at the taxi stand to avoid overcharging.

Public Transportation

Public Transportation to Semmelweis University Faculty of Health Sciences:

Take the **100E** Airport Express **bus** from Terminal 2 directly **to Astoria or Kálvin tér (you can get off at either one)**. The service runs frequently, takes about 40–50 minutes, and requires a special ticket.

Astoria → Faculty of Health Sciences

From Astoria station (where the 100E stops), you have two easy options:

Option A: Walk

It's roughly a 10-minute walk:

Exit Astoria, head east along Rákóczi street, turn left on Szentkirály street

Option B: Bus for one stop

Right outside Astoria, Catch **bus 9, 5, 8E, 110, or 133E to Uránia bus stop**.

Please note: the name "*Uránia*" will not appear on the front of the bus – only the final destination is displayed. Make sure to **check the route at the bus stop** to confirm you're boarding in the correct direction.

From Uránia, it's just a 2-minute walk to Szentkirály street.

Metro:

M4 (Green Line): The closest metro station to the university is **Kálvin tér**, which is a short walk from the Faculty of Health Sciences. From here, you can quickly reach the university by foot.

Other option: **M2 (Red Line)** to **Astoria**, take the exit towards Múzeum körút. Continue on Rákóczi Street towards Blaha Lujza Square on the right, then turn right at the second street corner into Szentkirály Street. Continue for two hundred meters to the University building.

Introducing the Keynote Speakers



Tamás Palicz MD PhD
Vice Director,
Semmelweis University Health
Services Management Training Centre



Dr. Tamás Palicz earned his medical degree from the University of Debrecen in 1993 and became a specialist in internal medicine in 1998.

After completing his clinical years, he has been involved in planning, implementing, and monitoring EU-funded projects since 2000.

Additionally, since 2003, he has held leadership roles in healthcare and public administration institutions. His primary interests include leading organizational change in human-service organizations and managing related projects.

He has been the Deputy Strategic Director of the Semmelweis University Health Management Training Center since 2015. In recent years, in the context of healthcare's digital transformation, he has focused on artificial intelligence and cybersecurity within healthcare organizations.





Małgorzata Szkup, PhD, MSc, RN,
Associate Professor,

in Szczecin

Ass. Professor Małgorzata Szkup, is an academic and practitioner in the field of nursing. She began her nursing career in 2002 by enrolling at Pomeranian Medical University in Szczecin (PMU), where she earned her BSc. In 2007, she obtained an MSc, followed by a PhD in Medical Sciences in 2010.

Immediately after completing her master's degree, she joined the Department of Nursing Science at the Faculty of Health Sciences at PMU. She currently serves as the Head of the Independent Department of Social Nursing and Vice-Dean of the Faculty of Health Sciences.

Her interest in transcultural nursing began 15 years ago when this subject was introduced into the standard nursing education curriculum in Poland and played a pioneering role in this field by developing the first transcultural nursing, which laid the foundation for her continued educational efforts. She has been committed to fostering students' cultural competencies, compassion, and reflection.

Her significant achievements is leading the 'MultiCultiMed'. She established a consortium of six European universities, strengthening international collaboration in transcultural medical education.

She completed her graduation education at Ege University in Izmir, Turkey, and is currently a Professor of Paediatric Nursing and the Head of the Department of Paediatric Nursing, Near East University in Northern Cyprus.

She is one of the pioneers of transcultural nursing education in Turkey. The course Transcultural Nursing was introduced for the first time in the curriculum of Dokuz Eylül University School of Nursing. She has coordinated international relations at various institutions and has taken part in numerous international and European Union-funded projects.

She is a founding member of the European Transcultural Nursing Association (ETNA), which was established in 2005 in Italy and two terms as the Secretary of the Association and organized ETNA's first international congress in 2007. She currently continues to serve as ETNA's national representative for Turkey.

She has published numerous national and international articles and book chapters. Since 2000, she has been committed to research and education focused on integrating cultural diversity into nursing practice. She continues to be a prominent voice in the field of transcultural nursing.
