



Information for OET candidates

OET is a healthcare-specific English language test. It assesses the language proficiency of healthcare professionals seeking to register and practise in an English-speaking environment.

OET is accepted as proof of English proficiency in the UK, Ireland, Australia, New Zealand, Dubai, Namibia, Ukraine and Singapore for registration in 12 healthcare professions. OET is also accepted by the Australian Department of Home Affairs, and Immigration New Zealand for most visa categories.

Is OET the right test for me?

OET tests international health practitioners from the following 12 professions:

Why should I take OET?

- ✓ OET is the English language test designed specifically for healthcare professionals.
- ✓ OET is recognised as proof of English proficiency by governments, healthcare regulators, employers, and educators.
- ✓ OET helps develop language skills for success in healthcare courses, clinical placement, healthcare registration and the workplace.
- ✓ It's easy to prepare for the test using OET's preparation resources, many of which are online and included in the cost of the test.

How is OET different to general or academic English tests?

OET tests real communication scenarios you will experience in the healthcare workplace, whereas other tests assess English language skills using everyday scenarios.

OET is accepted as proof of English proficiency for visas in:

Australia | The Australian Department of Home Affairs accepts OET for all visa categories where an English test may be required. Visit www.homeaffairs.gov.au for more details.

New Zealand | Immigration New Zealand accepts OET for all visa categories where an English test may be required. Visit www.immigration.govt.nz for more details.

Healthcare Boards and Councils

OET is accepted as proof of English proficiency by major Healthcare Boards and Councils in the UK, Ireland, Australia, New Zealand, Dubai, Namibia, Singapore and the Ukraine.

Qualification Authorities

Dubai | The Dubai Knowledge and Human Development Authority (KHDA) accepts OET as a quality standard qualification for proof of English proficiency.

New Zealand | The New Zealand Qualifications Authority (NZQA) accepts OET as an approved English Proficiency Assessment.

Universities and education providers

OET is accepted as proof of English proficiency by a growing number of leading educators for admission and graduation from healthcare courses.

What's in the test?

OET covers all four language skills with an emphasis on communication in a healthcare environment. The Listening and Reading sub-tests are designed to assess your ability to understand spoken and written English, based on health-related topics and tasks common to all professions. The Writing and Speaking sub-tests are specific to the 12 individual healthcare professions – designed to reflect common tasks performed in the workplace.



Writing
(45 minutes)

Writing a profession-specific letter of referral or discharge; or a letter to inform or advise a patient/carer/group.



Speaking
(45 minutes)

Profession-specific scenario role-plays with an interlocutor who plays the part of a patient/relative/carer.



Reading
(60 minutes)

Completion of a health-related summary paragraph and multiple choice questions on a longer health-related text.



Listening
(50 minutes)

Note-taking on a recorded professional consultation and a range of questions on a health-related talk.

When and how will I receive my results?

Your results will be released approximately 16 business days after the test: log in to your secure online profile to see them.

How is OET scored?

You will receive a numerical score ranging from 0–500 in ten-point increments (e.g. 350, 360, 370...). The numeric scores will be mapped to a separate letter grade for each sub-test ranging from A (highest) to E (lowest). There is no overall grade.
